

Maha Kumbh Mela, Prayagraj (January 14th – February 26th, 2025)

Among the world's largest spiritual gatherings, the Maha Kumbh, will be held in 2025, drawing millions of pilgrims to the confluence of the rivers Ganges, Yamuna, and the mythological river, Saraswati. The place where the rivers converge, locally called the *Sangam*, has great religions significance. It is believed that to bathe here washes away one's sins and grants spiritual liberation. All year round, devotees visit the Sangam at Prayagraj (formerly Allahabad), and during the Kumbh Mela, this sacred ritual reaches an unparalleled scale. Held every 12 years, the Kumbh Mela transforms the city into a bustling pilgrimage centre.

P&L recommends: The main rite performed at the Kumbh Mela is the ritual bath. Ritual baths take place every day, however, the most important days are known as *Shahi Snan*, or 'Royal Baths'. This will be held on January 13th, 14th & 29th and February 4th, 12th & 26th.



Off-the-beaten Track at Ramathra Fort, Sapotra (Rajasthan)

Perched on a gently sloping hill Ramathra Fort in Rajasthan, offers sweeping, serene views of the surrounding countryside, and a large perennial lake. Over 350 years old, it has been meticulously restored by artisans using locally sourced materials, preserving its traditional style and cultural integrity. The property, located in the heart of rural Rajasthan, offers guests an immersive royal experience at an authentically restored historical site. Accommodation is in four well-appointed rooms, two generously sized suites and six luxurious Rajasthani-style tents pitched on the courtyard lawn. A stay at Ramathra combines the charm of this historic hill fort with unforgettable excursions, nature walks, cooking demonstrations and safaris to the adjoining Keoladeo Ghana Bird Sanctuary and Ranthambore Tiger Reserve. When guests are not exploring the countryside, the fort is a wonderful place to relax with comfortable day beds, a double spa treatment room for massages and a heated jacuzzi in one of the turrets of the fort.

The Great Exotic Flower Tour

Flowers and floral motifs are a commonly occurring theme in Jaipur. You will see them gracing the architecture in the city, its block printing techniques, and in its richly woven fabrics – a celebration of nature at every turn. One of the fun activities that you can do in the city is to participate in a flower themed tour. During this tour, you will visit a bustling flower market, enjoy the delectable *laddoo* infused with edible flowers (a very popular local sweet), witness flowers being offered as sacred offerings at temples, visit a sustainable design studio to see the printing techniques used on textiles and finally, end your tour with a flower infused beauty treatment.



Flavors of India: Railway Lamb Curry

In the 18th century, the British East India Company set up shop in India and over time, introduced a cuisine that fused Indian spices with the British meaty stews and roasts. This new contemporary cuisine was neither too bland nor too spicy but had a distinct flavor of its own. A gem of this Anglo-Indian cuisine is, Railway Lamb Curry. It was originally prepared for individuals who travelled in the Indian Railways' First-Class carriage during British rule in India. The original recipe called for goat, but we have substituted it for lamb. For those of you who don't eat red meat, the recipe works well with chicken.
